The North Dakota Pharmacist's Association named Dr. Brody Maack North Dakota Health-System Pharmacist of the Year at their annual convention in Minot, ND.




Samantha Poehls, Enrollment Specialist

WHAT INSPIRED YOUR JOURNEY INTO THE MEDICAL FIELD? WAS IT A CHILDHOOD DREAM OR A REALIZATION THAT CAME LATER IN LIFE?

Oh, no, I never thought of becoming a doctor. I'm not a generational family doctor or anything. When I finished college, I went to the ministry. I went to the seminary – so that was what my first intention was. My bishop couldn't send me to a good seminary, so he sent me to a not very good one and I got pretty bored. So, I was bored, and I asked the bishop to send me to a good seminary, but he didn't have money. My family didn't want their only son to become a priest, so, I took a break from the seminary.

During that break is when I met who became my wife later. So, it was this girl from Fargo who came to Peru on a mission. Then I was out of seminary, I was dating this girl, and then, my parents said well, now you left the seminary and you have to do a real thing. They thought the seminary was not real. Well, I said, I'll just go back to school. I was planning to be a social worker but in Peru male social workers never get a job. So, I said, well, I think I will just go to medical school. And I studied, passed the tests, and got in.

I always knew that I wanted to work with people, that was the main motivation. I wanted to have direct contact with people. In the ministry, social work, or medicine, you know, my motivation has always been helping people. And I can tell you, that is how I live. I am fascinated by the dreams, hopes, successes, and struggles of my patients. To me, medicine is just a tool to be able to work with people and help them. I enjoy the technicalities of medicine, but that's not the main reason why I'm a doctor. Being a doctor enables me to help people, and I believe in the power of healing. Medicine, to me, is a great avenue for making a positive impact.

CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR EXPERIENCE COMPLETING YOUR RESIDENCY AT FAMILY HEALTHCARE?

I started my residency in 1995. I came from Peru a couple years earlier, but I didn't know English when I moved to Fargo. I had to learn English and take the test for the board, so it took me a couple years.

It was a challenge for me because my English wasn't great. Imagine you had to write a medical history during a physical, but you don't understand what the person is saying. Basically, baptism by fire – I learned the language in 3 or 4 months, and I was understanding all the jargon, but it was stressful.

Then, gradually I moved into the outpatient setting, which I really enjoyed. During my residency, I focused on obstetrics and OB-GYN and neonatal care. I was planning to go back home. In Peru, mothers and children are the most in need so I was really tailoring my training to go back home and practice. I did tons of rotations in obstetrics and neonatal care. Then, in my third year I was planning to do a maternal and child fellowship at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN.

Toward the end of my residency, my wife got diagnosed with cancer. That changed all my plans. I decided to stay because her family was in Fargo, and we had a good support group. At this point in 1998, I was offered a job to help teach and see patients at Family HealthCare and I've been here ever since.

Laura, Dr. Espejo's wife, passed away after battling cancer for two years. He remained in Fargo with his four children to stay close to their mother's family who has always been so supportive and caring. In 2003, Dr. Espejo married Marlene

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE BIGGEST CHANGES YOU'VE SEEN AT FHC SINCE YOU'VE BEEN HERE?

We used to have a tiny clinic. I think at that time we had 6,000 patients and now we have over 17,000 patients. The size has grown dramatically.

WHAT DO YOU THINK HAS BEEN THE MOST SIGNIFICANT TECHNOLOGICAL ADVANCEMENT IN THE PAST 25 YEARS?

Electronic Medical Records (EMR) would probably be the most dramatic change in clinical practice for us at Family HealthCare. It was a game changer for most physicians. Unfortunately for me, the most challenging thing (and everyone already knows this) is electronics and doing things on the computer. In patient care, putting medical records on the computer is the most difficult part of being a provider for me.

WHAT SETS FHC APART FROM OTHER CLINICS?

The emphasis is on serving the most vulnerable in our community. I wouldn't be here if Family HealthCare didn't believe in helping the most vulnerable. I know leadership cares about the patients and the community. So, I think patient care is always at the top of our minds and everyone here cares about that. The big hospitals are great, but if they have more cash, they will save it. When we have more cash, we try to help more people, even if we get into a venture where we don't make any money. If we know a service will need to be subsidized, we will still offer it because my heart says, 'We need to do that! The community

HOW HAVE PATIENT DEMOGRAPHICS CHANGED OVER THE PAST 25 YEARS?

When I started it was the end of the influx of Vietnamese refugees. Then we served a lot of Kurdish, Bosnian, Somalian, and Bhutanese refugees throughout the years. We've been focused on refugee health for many years. With each war we have more immigrants and refugees from other countries. When I first started patient care was very fragmented. We'd have families of eight and we'd have to split them up to see different providers.

Now, we prioritize what is more convenient for the patient. We've standardized everything and now have a couple providers who specialize in refugee health to make sure everything is done consistently. We started doing group clinics because sometimes patients come late and suddenly you have eight patients showing up at ten in the morning. In the past, if that happened, they would just be sent home and be forced to reschedule. That isn't right. We must see them. Those are the changes we've made over the years with priorities. You must adapt to the community you are serving, not expect the community to adapt to you.

As a civil surgeon, Dr. Espejo conducts medical exams on immigrants and refugees regularly. Those seeking permanent residency or certain types of visas are required to have an examination and the doctor must be certified by the United States Citizen and Immigration Services (USCIS). Dr. Espejo is one of only two civil surgeons in Fargo and there are only five total in the entire state of North Dakota.

WHEN YOU THINK ABOUT YOUR YEARS HERE, WHAT IS THE MOST REWARDING THING ABOUT WORKING AT FHC?

When patients take charge of their own health. I always believe that healthcare, medicine particularly, is a coaching job. My job is to offer options to the patients. And once they take ownership, it really changes everything. What I love the most is that transition into owning their health.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE MEMORY FROM FAMILY HEALTHCARE OVER THE PAST 25 YEARS?

One of my most personally rewarding experiences throughout the years was caring for a patient who had triplets. Now, even though primary care should not be taking care of triplets, she couldn't move much, so I went to her home. She only spoke Spanish. She and her husband are still my patients. The other thing is, now I delivered babies of the babies I delivered. So, I also delivered the mom of some of the babies which is very rewarding!

TELL US ABOUT YOUR FAMILY.

I have four kids. My oldest is going to have a baby next week. I am going to Zambia next Sunday to visit her. This will be her second child. Then I have 3 boys, one in Denver who has one son, one in Tuscan who has one son, and one in Fargo who is single. I am going to have 4 grandsons, no granddaughters.



WHAT DO YOU LIKE TO DO IN YOUR SPARE TIME?

I like running, hiking, kayaking, reading, singing, and playing the guitar. And I do it regularly - running three times per week, playing the guitar for at least 30 minutes a day. It relaxes me.

DR. ESPEJO, AREN'T YOU ALSO A GOOD DANCER?

I'm not a good dancer, not for Latina standards. Not for where I come from. I always joke that I went into medicine because I couldn't dance. I am decent because I come from a very joyful rhythmic community that likes to party and dance. But for those standards, I'm below that, the average, definitely, yeah.

Family HealthCare Receives \$400,000 Grant Award from Direct Relief's Fund for Health Equity

Through this generous funding, we increased the behavioral health programs available at Family HealthCare by adding social and community health workers to the team, allowing us to double our current capacity to provide services to patients with behavioral health needs. These additions to our team have been instrumental in expanding the reach and impact of our behavioral health services. Together, with Direct Relief's support, we are making a lasting impact on the well-being of individuals and families in our community.

Family HealthCare Homeless Health Services receives Blue Cross Blue Shield of North Dakota (BCBSND) Caring Foundation's Community Champion Award

The Community Champion Award recognizes high-impact community partners working to improve health equity, fill gaps in health care and ensure health access in their communities.



The Community Champion Awards were inspired by the findings of the Caring Foundation's study on Social Determinants of Health in partnership with the Center for Social Research at North Dakota State University. The study reveals several persistent economic and social disparities in North Dakota that require community driven solutions to address.

Governor Burgum signs

Senate Bill No. 2155

Governor Burgum signed Senate Bill No. 2155 (SB 2155), which will provide a direct allocation of two million dollars in state funds to the health centers in North Dakota over the next two years and provide a study on the possible expansion of Federally Quality Health Centers (FQHCs) in North Dakota. SB 2155 will provide grants to support the sustainability and development of services at community health centers like Family HealthCare. The bill also calls for a legislative management study regarding how the number of community health centers in North Dakota may be increased and how to improve collaboration with local public health units.



EXPANDING DENTAL ACCESS

Significant Contributions Boost Family HealthCare's Moorhead **Dental Expansion Project**

In a remarkable show of support, Family HealthCare's Moorhead Dental Expansion Project has received substantial financial support from the Warren B. and Geneva L. Anderson Family Foundation and the Otto Bremer Trust. These generous donations will significantly impact our mission to provide accessible and comprehensive dental care to the Moorhead community.

The Warren B. and Geneva L. Anderson Family Foundation has donated \$250,000, and The Otto Bremer Trust has given a \$200,000 grant award. These funds will double our dentistry working spaces from seven to fourteen and introduce a dental education program, opening doors for an additional 3,000 patients annually. Currently, around 9,000 patients rely on us for dental care, and the demand exceeds our capacity, leaving 2,500 patients, including the most vulnerable, waiting for vital care.

Dr. Matthew Eaton, Dental Director at Family HealthCare, expressed gratitude for both contributions, emphasizing that they will greatly benefit uninsured and underinsured families.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to both contributors for their unwavering support, as these donations are more than financial assistance; they are a testament to the power of our shared mission. Together, we take a momentous step toward realizing our vision of accessible and comprehensive healthcare for all in our community.
